Living Life Weekly Bible Study 1, November 4th Scripture, P178

Main Focus

Those who pursue a holy life and devote themselves to the truth are approved by the Lord.

Examine God's Word

Read 2 Timothy 2:14–26 together. Circle or underline repeated words or phrases that carry significant meaning.

Understand Setting

The Apostle Paul wrote 2 Timothy around AD 66–67 while he was imprisoned in Rome for the second time. During this period, a great fire broke out in Rome for reasons unknown, and Emperor Nero used Christians as scapegoats, launching a severe persecution against the church and believers. Paul sensed that he would not be released again and began to prepare himself for martyrdom. Timothy, a young pastor serving in Ephesus, was known to have a gentle and humble nature. Paul therefore exhorted Timothy to lead with spiritual strength, courage, and the character of God. In particular, 2 Timothy contains Paul's specific warnings and instructions regarding false teachers who spread untrue doctrines. Through today's passage, we will explore what God's people must pursue and what they must turn away from.

Meditate the Text

1-1 Observation According to verse 15, what kind of mindset does Paul urge Timothy to have as he serves in preaching the Word of truth?

1-2 Application What is the difference between living a life approved by God and living a life seeking approval from people? Share honestly—whose approval do you find yourself desiring more?

2-1 Observation In verses 22–23, what does Paul tell Timothy to avoid and to flee from? What does he encourage him to pursue instead?

2-2 Application Is there anything in your life right now that God is prompting you to avoid or let go of? Or perhaps something He is calling you to actively pursue? Share openly.

Review the Text

The Apostle Paul urged Timothy, who was pastoring in Ephesus, to correct those spreading false teachings and to stop engaging in meaningless quarrels. Just as in Timothy's time, even today there are people who promote unbiblical or anti-biblical teachings. As God's people and His workers, we must be firmly grounded in the Word so that we can clearly discern the truth. Moreover, we are called to gently correct others and help them draw closer to God. As a community, we should strive together to walk in the path of faith and peace that pleases the Lord.

Pray through the Text

- ① Lord, help us to firmly hold on to the true doctrines taught in Scripture.
- 2 Lord, make us people who can discern false teachings and gently correct others in Your grace.

Understand Setting

Meditate the Text

1-1 Observation What mindset did Paul urge Timothy to have as he preached the Word of truth? (v.15)

Paul told Timothy to present himself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, and who correctly handles the Word of truth.

Explanation The phrase "correctly handle" literally means "to cut straight." Paul emphasized Timothy's responsibility to interpret and teach God's Word accurately. In the first century, when Christian doctrine was not yet fully established, many false teachers were spreading unbiblical ideas within the church. Thus, Paul urged Timothy to approach God's Word with reverence, interpret it correctly, and teach it gently and clearly to the believers.

1-2 Application What is the difference between living a life approved by God and a life seeking approval from people? Whose approval do you find yourself desiring more?

Explanation Paul encouraged Timothy to strive to present himself before God, not people. Human approval is fleeting—no matter how much praise we receive, it fades and leaves us empty. But when the infinite and glorious God acknowledges and commends us, our hearts overflow with true joy and gratitude. Only God's approval brings lasting fulfillment and peace.

2-1 Observation What did Paul tell Timothy to avoid and to flee from, and what did he encourage him to pursue instead? (vv.22–23)

Paul instructed Timothy to flee from youthful passions, avoid foolish and ignorant controversies that lead to quarrels, and instead pursue righteousness, faith, love, and peace along with those who call on the Lord from a pure heart.

Explanation

The term "youthful passions" does not refer only to sensual temptations, but also to the immature tendencies of youth—such as impatience, overreacting, or being argumentative. Paul exhorted Timothy to join with believers who call on the Lord sincerely and to pursue the virtues of righteousness, faith, love, and peace. These qualities are gifts that flow from a close relationship with God and are meant to be cultivated within the community. Paul also lists the gift of leadership, which involves guiding others with diligence. True biblical leadership means carrying out one's responsibilities with faithfulness and perseverance.

Finally, Paul mentions the gift of mercy. This is the Spirit-given ability to care for the poor, the sick, and those who are vulnerable or weak.

2-2 Application Is there anything God has recently told you to avoid or let go of? Or something He is calling you to pursue?

Explanation Through Scripture, God continually reveals His good and pleasing will. We are called to flee from temptation and selfish desire, and to follow the direction of His Word. Walking in the path God points out is the essence of a genuine life of faith that pleases Him.

Review the Text

The Apostle Paul encouraged Timothy, who was pastoring in Ephesus, to correct false teachers and avoid meaningless quarrels. Just as in Timothy's time, our world today also has those who spread unbiblical or anti-biblical teachings. As God's people and workers, we must build our discernment on the firm foundation of Scripture. With gentleness, we are to guide others and lead them toward God. Together as a community, let us strive to walk in faith and peace—the path that pleases the Lord.

Pray through the Text

- ① Lord, help us to firmly hold on to the true doctrines taught in Your Word.
- 2 Lord, make us people who can discern false teachings and gently correct others in Your love.

Word Studies

Verse 14 Remind them of these things Apostle Paul expressed to Timothy "remind them of these things," which means repeated mention and teaching. In other words, it means teaching repeatedly to stop quarrels. There are two reasons to stop quarrels: first, they are useless, and second, they cause ruin to those who hear them. "Paul outlined two results of such verbal quibbles. First, it accomplishes no good purpose ("is useless," NASB; "is of no value," NIV). Second, it works to the ruin of those who participate in it ("brings destruction on those who hear it," Williams). The word for "ruins" (katastrophē) describes the tearing down of believers." Thomas Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 166.

Verse 15 A worker approved Apostle Paul used the word "worker" when exhorting Timothy, which at that time meant a laborer in farming. Paul encourages Timothy to be humble and to do his best even in small tasks. "The term "workman" is frequently used in reference to an agricultural laborer (e.g., Jas 5:4), but here Paul used the term to describe a laborer for God. Paul was urging his Christian friend to work with such diligence that he would have no fear of shame for poor quality work."_Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 166.

Verse 16 Empty and worthless talk Empty talk refers to arguments unrelated to truth and meaningless disputes. Paul expressed to Timothy in the present imperative to avoid empty talk, indicating that Timothy must always be alert to the threat of heresy. "The use of the present imperative for "avoid" suggests that Timothy had to remain continually alert to the threat of heresy."_Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 167.

Verse 17 Gangrene Apostle Paul likened heretics spreading false truth to a malignant tumor. The term malignant tumor refers to tissue gradually dying due to lack of blood supply. Therefore, corrupt heretical teaching can harm the church in Ephesus, the body of Christ. We must be cautious of false teachings regarding the truth. "Paul compared the spread of the heresy to the spread of gangrene through the body. The term for gangrene, used only here in the New Testament, describes the death of bodily tissues due to the loss of blood supply."_Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 167.

Verse 19a God's firm foundation The phrase "firm foundation" used by Paul refers to the whole church in Ephesus. Secondarily, it may also refer to the content of faith in Jesus Christ revealed by God.

Verse 19b Sealed In the Bible, "seal" refers to a mark or stamp that proves definite ownership. This signifies that God knows and cares for His people. "A seal is a sign or a stamp of approval that shows genuineness or attests ownership. Paul pictured God's people as stamped with two seals." _ Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 167.

Verse 20 Large house PThrough the expression "large house," Paul represents the church. That house contains many types of vessels: gold, silver, wooden, and clay. Gold and silver vessels are used for noble purposes, while wooden or clay vessels are for common or lowly purposes. The "articles of gold and silver" refer to valuable and commendable Christians, while the "articles of wood and clay" refer to shameful or spiritually unfaithful people, i.e., those to be avoided. "In using the expression "articles ... of wood and clay," he spoke of unworthy Christians, who were to be avoided. Paul was suggesting that the church contained both faithful and unfaithful believers."_Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 169.

Verse 21 Purify oneself Apostle Paul exhorts Timothy and the church to distinguish false teaching and separate from it. It is important to note that while false doctrine should be discerned, people should be instructed correctly. "His emphasis on what Timothy should avoid in 2:14, 16 related more to the content of the false teaching than to the person of the false teacher. Later in this chapter Paul would appeal for Timothy to instruct false teachers so that they could repent of heretical views [2:24–26]."_Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 169.

Verse 22 Flee youthful passions Apostle Paul used the imperative to tell Timothy to flee the "evil desires of youth." This word refers less to physical temptations and more to attitudes arising from immaturity in youth, such as hasty reactions, long arguments over trivial matters, or anger. "Young men can be characterized by partiality, intolerance, half heartedness, and unwarranted self-assertion. These were the qualities Timothy was to avoid." Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 169.

Verse 23 Avoid foolish and ignorant controversies Paul is not forbidding healthy discussion to understand the truth. He exhorts to abandon meaningless disputes that are useless and create division by questioning alone. "Paul was not prohibiting intelligent, probing theological discussion but useless wrangling over recondite questions that divide and confuse. We must cultivate a judgment that can distinguish between these options." Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 170.

Verse 24 Gentleness Apostle Paul mentions the virtues a servant of the Lord should have. A servant of the Lord should teach truth without quarrels and with gentleness. The gentleness here means firmly holding the truth of the gospel while giving warm, tolerant instruction. "The call for gentleness demands a tolerance in spirit without a weakening of evangelical orthodoxy." Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 171.

Verse 25 Lead to repentance Paul exhorts Timothy to correct with gentleness. The goal of gentle correction is that unbelievers or those who believe false doctrines recognize their wrongdoing, repent, and dedicate themselves anew to God. "Paul wanted the false teachers to experience repentance so that they would acknowledge the truth. To acknowledge the truth involved understanding the gospel so that they might experience a genuine commitment to Christ." Lea, 1, 2 Timothy in NAC, 171.
